# Hohepa Homes

The first Hohepa home was established at Poraiti in Hawkes Bay in 1957. This was a joint initiative of Mariorie Allan MBE and Lew Harris (subsequently "Sir") a local farmer and benefactor who had a disabled daughter. Hohepa is Maori for Joseph and was named for Sir Lew's father.

Hohepa Canterbury, established 1965, was originally on the Port Hills but moved to its current 2<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> hectare site in Barrington in 1964. A 40 acre farm was purchased in 1984 at Halswell.

Hohepa Homes provided for the purpose of establishing and maintaining homes and schools for curative education, and social therapy of children and young persons. Over time this has been extended to a range of lifestyle supports for adults with intellectual disability.

Grey Power members on our monthly bus trip were recently privileged to attend a stage performance given by a group of mixed age members of the home in Barrington. The coordination between their varied ages, many without props, and a keen intent to keep the artistic aspect of 'Circus' true in our minds was most appreciated. The tempo of the music reflected their individual joy and effort to perform.

Our members were thus able, at first hand, to appreciate the result of coordinated care, tuition and obvious rapport that abounds within the Barrington home. Our stay, all but too brief, included being invited to partake of refreshments after the stage performance, during which it was possible to chat with some of the care givers, I don't like using 'staff' in this context, who warmly extolled the virtues of being there as if the whole thing was a family affair and they were but the parents.

Keeping warm in the cold winter months is absolutely vital to everybody's wellbeing and makes all the difference to your health. As Minister of Energy and Resources it has been an absolute pleasure to see two new measures put in place recently to help combat the winter chills for some of our most vulnerable New Zealanders. The first of these is the Winter Energy payment, which will help those over 65 or receiving a benefit with the cost of their electricity bills.

However, it's not just through the Winter Energy payment that we are seeking to ensure that New Zealanders are able to keep warm without resorting to wearing multiple layers or huddling by a heater. We've also introduced the Warmer Kiwi Homes programme, which will be facilitated through the **Energy Efficiency and Conservation Authority.** This first year of the programme which I launched on 1 July in Christchurch will focus on insulation grants, and grants for heating will become available from July 2019. We've lifted the level of funding per grant from 25% by the previous government to two thirds of the cost, and we expect that around 52,000 families will benefit.

This will allow low-income homeowners to warm up with grants covering 67% of the cost of ceiling and underfloor insulation. These grants are specifically targeted towards those we know need them most, such as those who live in low decile areas, with health conditions or community services cards.

The combination of these two measures reflect the kind of Government that Prime Minister Jacinda



Ardern has said we will be - compassionate, inclusive and ambitious. All New Zealanders deserve to be warm over winter, and to not be forgotten or neglected. Thousands of New Zealanders will now have warmer homes and lower electricity bills as part of the Government measures, reducing the cost of living for those most in need.

How do we help our network of museums - small and large - with access to support, skills, and knowledge that helps them specialise in their unique local stories and themes while ensuring all aspects of local history are recorded, maintained, and accessible? This is run by staff and supported by a dedicated group of volunteers. The aims are to assist those working to gain skills and independence and self-esteem. They make numerous items. Soft toys, sheepskin covered coat hangers, handmade occasion cards and some become proficient weavers of woollen materials made into garments. One really appreciates that these folk are being productive in the workforce despite any disability they may have. We give thanks that the Trust raises funds to provide premises, support staff equipment and materials that this work is available for those less fortunate than ourselves. In August we will be visiting Kaiapoi, another of our earthquake towns where we will be given a hot meal at the Kaiapoi Working Men's Club and then boarding our Coach to drive to the Tuahiwi Primary School where the children will entertain us. # Up to 92% insulation subsidy for homeowners

Are you ready for the spring months ahead? Don't forget about the importance of insulation - it will keep your home warm in winter and cool in summer. And now is the best time to get it sorted! The government announced a new four year insulation and heating programme in July targeted at homeowners, with qualifying household's receiving up to 92% subsidy on the costs of ceiling and underfloor insulation.

If affordability is an issue for homeowners, CEA may be able to organise other financial assistance including interest free payment plans over a number of months. Criteria applies.

From July 1st 2018 homeowners will be eligible for subsidies if they meet the following criteria:

- The home must be owner-occupied i.e. it can't be a rental property AND
- The home must be built before 2008.

#### In addition:

- The homeowner must have a Community Services Card or a Super Gold combo card OR
- The homeowner has been referred by the Ministry of Health (currently North Island only) OR
- The home is located in an area identified as lowerincome; contact CEA to find out if your address qualifies.

Please note: The new subsidy does not include landlords.

# Good news for residents of retirement villages

Minister of Local Government, Hon Nanaia Mahuta, has announced that from 1 July 2018, eligible retirement village residents will be able to apply to their local council for a rates rebate.

"The Rates Rebate (Retirement Village Residents) Amendment Act 2018, ensures that retirement village residents who do not own their unit, but pay fees to live there, are recognised as rate payers, and are therefore entitled to apply for a rebate," says Minister Mahuta. Eligible residents are required to fill out an application form, and provide a declaration certificate completed by their village operator. Both of these documents, along with eligibility criteria, will be available on the Department of Internal Affairs website from 1 July 2018.

"If you have any queries about your eligibility or that of a family member, I encourage you to get in touch with your local council or retirement village operator," says Nanaia Mahuta.
