
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President's Message

The Grey Power Federation's AGM

The GREY POWER FEDERATION held its Annual General Meeting in Wellington recently. Gillian Dance (President) and Lingappa Kalburgi (Treasurer) attended as delegates, with Nanette Nathoo (Vice-President) as an Observer.

It was well attended with lively and informative debates. There were fifteen policy remits put forward. The one sent in by Auckland which spelt out Grey Power's position regarding superannuation and other issues was passed, after some debate.

Auckland Association also held the proxy vote and spoke on behalf of the Far North's remit seeking to ensure that people with at least two years membership in an active role be eligible for any Board position.

Fuller reports of Remit discussion and Board Advocacy reports will be in the National Quarterly.

Grey Power had long lobbied for an Aged Care Commissioner, and the first appointee, Carolyn Cooper, spoke of her proposed actions in her new role. Dr Susy Morrissey, Director of Policy at the Retirement Commission, works closely with the new Commissioner. Both women have extensive practical experience in the Age Care fields.

Dr Ayesha Verall, Minister of Seniors, gave an excellent address via video. Other speakers were Rachael O'Connor, a Human Rights Spokesperson, and John Collyns from the Retirement Village Association.

CONSIDER OUR SENIORS - OUR TREES

The Tree Council is delighted to announce that we have settled, with an out-of-court agreement with Auckland Council, our judicial review of Auckland Council's November 2020 decision not to allocate any resources to the management of Schedule 10 (Notable Trees).

The specific terms of the settlement are confidential to the parties and cannot be disclosed, but we are now confident that Auckland Council will take a more proactive approach to the management of Schedule 10 in future as a result of this legal action.

The Tree Council challenged the decision of the November 2020 Planning Committee and lodged judicial review proceedings in the High Court in November 2021. At that time Auckland Council had not added a single new tree to the Notable Trees Schedule in 9 years and had placed a statement on its website discouraging the public from nominating new trees because they would not be processed by the Council.

The Tree Council's Chair Sean Freeman says "It is a disgrace that The Tree Council had to resort to court action to force Auckland Council to recognise its legal obligation to actively manage the Schedule of Notable Trees. However, we are pleased that this action has resulted in a positive response from the Council and we look forward to seeing a more proactive approach to their management of these important assets in the future."

"The Tree Council requests that the public now let us know where the biggest and best trees in Auckland are located so that we can assess their suitability for nomination to Schedule 10. It is vitally important that we identify these heritage assets now and get them legally protected because they are highly threatened by the intensification and development that will accelerate over the next few years."

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There are many issues that I am concerned about leading up to this year's local election.

The high and increasing levels of municipal debt is a cost to the ratepayer now and in the future. The cost is one passed onto everyone living in the city, and is loaded by landlords onto tenant's rents.

Then there is the wasted spending (\$65 million written off by the Ports of Auckland) and excessively high staff salaries. Contracted services seem to take years before fixing a pot hole.

I think we need a Mayor and Councillors who have a firm handle on the reins and who will focus on the essentials. A focus on what is absolutely needed for our city and not the "nice to have" frills.

As an older long term senior resident my priorities would be that I would like the Mayor and Councillors to focus on keeping the rates as low as possible, to look at the needs of older residents and make some simple meaningful changes to benefit everyone, both businesses and those who rent or own a home. But with particular attention to the needs of older citizens.

Recent Council draft annual Plans scarcely mention senior citizens. Senior citizens have transport needs. They have housing needs. They need to be able to stay in their own homes and not be rated out. They need to have provision to be able to afford their rates.

So what could be done? I do not claim to know of all possible suggestions, but I could mention some.

An immediate change that could be made would be to reintroduce public transport through neighbourhood streets. The public bus system is not just there to run up main arterial streets to provide transport at peak times into and from the city centre.

It may be more profitable and suits the needs of those in younger age brackets, but it should also meet the needs of older citizens with less physical abilities than they had when they were younger. Auckland is not flat. There are many steep climbs even on main roads.

Small connecting buses travelling through neighbourhoods that went past local shopping centres and community halls and facilities could be reintroduced. Public transport planning for Auckland should include increasing bus stops, not reducing them. If Auckland Transport is really serious about getting the public to switch to public transport then we need a frequent, reliable, elder-friendly and people-friendly, metro bus service.

If Auckland Council and Auckland Transport want to show that they are serious about tackling the city's traffic congestion problems, then they need to realise that Auckland Transport needs to serve ALL the people who live in this city.

What to consider when voting in September Local Body Elections

- 1. Voting turnouts in Local Government elections have been very low at around 32-38%
- 2. Local Government Elections affect decisions made with how our rates are spent
- 3. These decisions affect our every day lives
- 4. Whilst the mayor only gets one vote like all the other 20 Councillors, they do get to control who chairs the 13 subcommittees and who are on each of these committees. The Chair controls the Agenda of these committees with an extra \$40,000 salary. For example the increase in rates as a subject can exclude the option of 'no increase'

Some of the more import subcommittees are: Finance and Performance (how money is spent and rate increases); Strategic Procurement (awarding contracts); Environment and Climate Change (includes tree protection); Oversite Council Controlled Organisation;

Appointments and Performance Review (whether Councillors on the Boards of CCO). This is where the Mayor's power lies.

- It's early in the campaign and the Mayoral debates have just begun - attend a debate in your area: AGP's Mayor Debate 10am Friday 23 September Mt Albert War Memorial Hall
- There are 4 main 'right leaning candidates';
 Wayne Brown, Viv Beck, Craig Lord and Leo Molloy, and one 'left leaning candidate'
 Efeso Collins. The latter is the only current Councillor (Collins) and only one who has run for Mayor before (Lord came third in 2019)
- 7. Each candidate has their pet projects and platforms. Who they are likely to bring in as Deputy also influences the picture
- 8. Many believe there is no place for party politics in Local Government
- 9. Each of the 20 Councillors and the Mayor have voting rights at 'the table'. The Mayor has the casting vote.
- 10. None of the mayoral candidates are hedging their bets by also running for Council seat. That seems to be a waste as there is some great

- energy amongst them that would add to'the table'
- 11. Not all Councillor candidates have announced VFT
- 12. Councillors are supposed to represent their constituents. But some do not, and have blocked input from their community, other than their supporters. Is your Councillor active in your community?
- 13. The intended interface with the people, are the Local Boards. Are your Board members active in your community?
- 14. Never let one political party or faction control the vote of a Board. That means the voice of the people is unheard.
- 15. The Councillor's Wards are determined by the population in each area. There are 13 Wards, some Wards have 2 Councillors, some Wards are made up of 2 Local Boards. It may seem confusing. However, all is explained. Read the information booklets sent out to you with your postal voting packs carefully. They will list all the details of the candidates in the area in which you live.
- 16. We, the ratepayer, who pay the wages of elected officials, deserve to be heard, not just in our votes at election time, but through their term in power.
- 17. Look at each councillor's track record in how they have voted on the issues that are important to you. And for new candidates, how their policies fit your views. Most have social media pages, find them on Facebook and Google search
- 18. Don't vote for a pretty face or a name drop or an ego. Vote on how their vote reflects your view.
- 19. The primary role of an elected representative is to represent the public to the council not the other way round.
- 20. Vote, vote, VOTE!



Grey Power believes New Zealand superannuation to be a state, tax-funded scheme payable at the age of 65 years that allows the retired person an adequate income to live in reasonable comfort and dignity and be able to participate fully in the community. That superannuation be accepted as an entitlement and not means-tested. This income should

include a special provision to provide for the needs of the person living alone. A multi-party Superannuation Accord should secure the scheme.

The President of Auckland Greypower stated today that the Government could ease the burden created by inflation and the cost of living by simply removing taxation from Superannuation and all benefits.

The current cost of living increase is not going to these people. The increase Superannuants received in April was catch up for past inflation.

They are receiving nothing from this latest cost of living increase and yet a single woman or man receives less than \$25,000 a year. Well below the \$70,000 required to receive this latest

cost of living payment.

It's absolutely illogical. It's unbelievable that a Labour Government thinks like this.

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SHINGLES VACCINE

In April 2018 Pharmac funded the shingles vaccine for everyone aged 66-80 years old. This period was extended due to COVID until 31 December 2021.

Now that period has gone, anyone who is aged 66 and above who did not get a shingles vaccine during that 1 April 2018 – 31 December 2021 period would have to pay for it. It remains funded for everyone when they are 65 years old.

As you are all aware Grey Power does not agree with age being a factor in the availability of any medical or prevention services.

The new health system currently in the process of being implemented places a greater emphasis on equity of services and Grey Power will be pursuing our policy of age not being a factor for declining services.

Unfortunately in the meantime this is the situation with the shingles vaccine.

Anyone over 50 can get a free Covid 19 second booster. It is highly recommended for anyone over 65 or anyone with preexisting medical conditions.

Free influenza vaccines are available for those who qualify. Prevention or getting better immunity will lessen risk of severe illness and death.
