#### **Tracey's corner**

Oh no, what the heck is this? There's nothing more unnerving than having a car warning light appear on your dash!

#### PREDATOR FREE MATUA

Predator Free Matua is a volunteer, not-for-profit. community effort to rid the Peninsula of rats and mice and bring back the birds to our backyards and reserves. We have been distributing free backyard rat traps since March 2018 and now there are 335 rat traps spread across Matua. In 2021, we stepped up our efforts to get rid of pests from our little section of Tauranga. The first step in this has been undertaking a monitoring exercise to understand what pests are in our area, what their habits are and what we can learn. We have wrapped up this first monitoring phase with results from 80 backyards. 14% of backyards had rat activity in our tracking tunnels, and we found some very big rats! In using the trail cameras as well, we discovered a number of backyards that had no rat activity in the tracking tunnels, but rats were picked up running along fences and other areas - sneaky buggers! We found evidence of at least 1 stoat - a dangerous predator for our native birds. In addition, 17% of tunnels had hedgehog prints, although not a target species for us, these pests do have a large appetite for native insects, lizards and eggs of ground nesting birds.


We are still analyzing all the results but this will feed into a plan to intensify trapping in certain areas, with volunteers supporting households to undertake more trapping in hotspots.

Predator Free Matua was also chosen from over 70 predator free community groups to receive additional funding for traps that we can use to target rats as well as possums and stoats! Watch out Miramar, here comes another predator free peninsula! We know that pest numbers boom in Autumn, so we are getting prepared to be able to break that cycle.

If you would like to find out more information, get a rat trap, or can volunteer your help - we need everyone from people happy to make phone calls, to those who can check traps for friends we will be having an information evening 10th November, at 7pm at the Matua Bowling Club on Levers Road.

# **Strawberry Santas**

Makes: 20 Time to make: 15 minutes Ingredients:


- 20 medium-large strawberries, hulled for a flat base
- 100g Philadelphia Light cream cheese (Note: other brands of cream cheese can be too runny for this recipe; this is the one we've found works best.)
- 4 6 tsp icing sugar, to taste
- 40 mini dark-choc bits or chocolate chips

#### Method:

Cut the top third off each berry and reserve. Stand berry bases on a serving platter.

Mix cream cheese and icing sugar until smooth and creamy. Pipe or spoon 1 tsp cream onto flat berry tops.

Place reserved berry tops on top. Use the smallest piping



Use tweezers to place 2 chocolate pieces onto each cream "face" (eyes). Refrigerate until ready to serve.

Matua was well-represented among a group of 16 Ōtūmoetai College senior Food Technology students who triumphed recently at the 17th Annual Waikato Culinary Fare held at Wintec in Hamilton.

Matua residents Casey Conning, Macy Donaghy, Marc Spanswick and Chloe Boyt, along with 12 of their classmates, cooked up a storm at this regional competition, which is the largest of its type in New Zealand.

The students entered various classes including Cold Dessert, Entree, Chicken Dish, Healthy Lunch, Creative Burger and Savoury Pizza.

Year 13 student Casey was named Class Winner for her Gold Medalwinning Creative Burger, while Year 12 student Macv took out a Gold Medal and the Class Winner title in the Healthy Lunch category.

Fellow students Ben Barrett and Holly Speirs were also the winners of their Classes, likewise bringing home Gold Medals, while a further 7 Silver, 3 Bronze Medals and a Merit were awarded to the remaining members of the group. Collectively the students brought home a grand total of 15 medals.

The competition is the edible culmination of the year's NCEAlevel work for these students, who were required to work through a design process to develop ideas for a dish, test them on willing consumers, refine them and ultimately recreate them in the





kitchens of the Rotokauri Campus.

All 16 students who attended worked with determination, passion and pride, according to their teacher and mentor, Head of Technology Lauren May. Many of the judges commented on how impressed they were with the students' work ethic, imaginative ideas and immaculate presentation

"These legends have researched, modelled and had malfunctions - some of epic proportions!" said Mrs May. "They have continuously refined their concepts to produce some spectacular outcomes and have triumphed! It has been a joy and a privilege to be just a tiny part of their learning and journey of

growth, into the incredible humans they are today."

Participant Casey Conning's Creative Burger was made from a sweet bun with a filling of chocolate cheesecake, bacon, fried banana and caramel and hand-made edible skewer. She described the experience as "the most stressful thing I've done, hard work but very rewarding. I'm proud that it came out successfully at the end".

We are all proud of the fantastic achievements of this outstanding group of students in what has been the Technology Department's most successful year yet at the competition!







#### **Amberwood Behind the Gates in Matua**



"A bare, dated, typical suburban NZ backyard, with fussy bitsy gardens hugging the house" was exactly how the landscaper described the garden in 1998 when my late husband, Murray, and I bought the property. But the landscaper was restrained; he did not add that it was an overgrown shambles, full of invasive weeds, tatty old half dead plants everywhere and no shade at all. His assessment-Clear-fell the lot.

From there a deciduous woodland took shape, with over forty saplings; A micro-climate was created and shade loving plants took shape beneath. I was handed the reins, and have done most of the physical work and re-planting ever since. Along with dappled summer shade, autumn leaf fall, and winter sun, birds came and brought the garden to seasonal life and a year later the garden was part of the Garden & Art Festival and will be again in November 2022.

Many years on, a dear friend, Colin Hutchinson, author of The Art of Gardening visited; wishing to add his magic. "More Romance! That's what it needs!", he loudly proclaimed. The "how" he said, "was with delicate silvers, coppers and fine foliage which would waft in the breeze". It truly was Art in the Garden. There was much good humour and quite a bit of wine, as this colourful character sketched out his ideas for me to implement.

In 2005 the editors of NZ Gardener slipped in amongst the Garden & Art Festival visitors, sat on a bench (incognito), and after a while told me they would like to write a feature on the garden. This they did, and came back in 2013 to write another. It was a great thrill. NZ House & Garden also published the garden in 2018, which dramatically captured the changes. True, there has been blood, sweat, tears, hard work and aching muscles, but that is all part of creating and maintaining a garden. It's called love!

Then something out of the blue happened. Four years

ago, during the festival. I discovered Ruud Kleinpaste, The Bug Man, in my garden! For me it was



like finding Elvis amongst the plants. There followed a hilarious tour during which he gaily said. "despite being a lovely garden, sadly there is nothing for native insects to eat and nowhere for them to live! An area needs to be much messier! Rotten logs! They are the Plankton of the Forest! Leaf litter! Plants that Wetas love! Weta Motels! That will do the trick!", he enthused.

Part of the garden is now an undisturbed native insect habitat. Ruud is hard to resist! Without our hardworking insects we are doomed, along with most wild life. Habitat destruction is rife with new builds.

People have kindly brought me Wetas – More needed!! If you find a weta or two – please contact me on the phone number below. Visitors have nothing to fear, as they are nocturnal. Snoozing all day in their motels. Many other insects hide away in this area and the soil is hugely improved because of it. The bird life has also increased.

And there it is, from "bare backyard" to a garden full of biodiversity and interest, and one that seems to impart peace and imagination.

Our clinic is running for all health checks and reviews. Please book in with your doctor if you have any health concerns. Plan in advance for repeat prescriptions to allow us time to process your request. This can take up to 48hours.

We have a new free service at Otumoetai doctors. We see people of all ages, and help with any type of issue. The aim is to support you to make a positive change in line with what's important to you or learn a skill to promote your wellbeing. Your doctor or nurse can refer you. The appointments are roughly 20 minutes. The session will focus on the most important problem for you that day, and support you to develop a practical plan to improve things.

We also have a Health Coach who will actively help you in the community. We see people for a range of difficulties such as: Stress/anxiety/low mood Relationship issues/parenting Sleep problems Lifestyle Changes/physical health

Addiction issues

Chronic pain Grief and loss

#### **Pharmacy Update From Unichem Cherrywood**

Stock Shortages October 2022. Due to the long-lasting global supply chain disruptions as a result of the COVID pandemic, pharmaceutical supply into New Zealand is disrupted and

uncertain. Pharmaceutical wholesalers in NZ and Pharmac are tirelessly trying to rectify this or find solutions but it does leave us short on a number of medicines at present. One way we are trying to ease these shortfalls is by restricting some medicines to monthly dispensing. By rationing medicines in this way, it ensures there is adequate supply to cover all of our patients, to make it through until more medicine reaches our

The medicines that are unavailable for some time or have uncertain continuity of supply are: Gaviscon Infant sachets, Locoid Scalp lotion, Locoid Lipocream, Pevaryl Foaming sachets, Estradiol patches, Special foods, Psyllium husk, amoxicillin/clavulanic acid tablets, to name a few. Please bear with us as we try to find a solution for your prescription in conjunction with your prescriber.

#### **Early On-Demand Music Streaming Required Lots of Nickels**

The machine had over 170 songs to choose from, each one assigned a different number. Customers would use its built-in telephone to connect with the local Multiphone station, filled with records and turntables. A DJ with a friendly voice would be waiting on the other end to answer the call and play the requested record. The stations, located in Seattle, Tacoma, Bremerton, and Spokane, were staffed entirely by

"You'd put your nickel [into the Multiphone] and you would hear a hostess from the central station ask through the speaker, 'what number, please?' And you'd say, I want number 202, 'Fools Such As I.' And then they'd grab the record from the rack, put it on the turntable associated with the location you were at, play it, and that was it," says Seattle historian John Bennett, author of the upcoming book The Shyvers Multiphone Story. Bennett, who runs Jukebox City, a vintage jukebox business in the Georgetown neighbourhood, is a Multiphone collector himself. A self-proclaimed antique hoarder, Bennett bought around 500 Multiphones in the 1980s, which he sold at an antique shop he owned at the time. Back then Multiphones only sold for \$100 a pop—today, they're much rarer,

and can go for over \$2,000.

The brainchild of Seattle inventor Ken Shyvers, Multiphones came onto the scene in 1939. At the time, jukeboxes were only spinning 20 or so records, at most. Shyvers wanted to expand the playlist, so he created the Shyvers Multiphone: a mini-jukebox, with an Art Deco aesthetic. It stood about 20 inches tall and, during its mid-century heyday, could be found anywhere from diner counters and bars to drive-in theatres.
