A word or two from our President

As I write this, stories are still emerging about the extent of damage and trauma from Cyclone Gabrielle. We can only feel for those that have been so badly affected and be thankful that Rotorua escaped comparatively lightly. We may not be so lucky another time, and Gabrielle is a wake-up call for all of us to be prepared with emergency supplies and escape plans for whatever sort of disaster might happen here.

Your committee has been thinking about how we can improve our communication with members. We are conscious that the quarterly magazine is too infrequent to be effective as a means of keeping members up to date with events such as forums and outings, or as a means of seeking members' input or reactions to issues that arise. For example, from time to time we see the need to make submissions to the Rotorua Lakes Council when they call for public input on proposals. Timeframes are often tight, and it would be good to have an efficient means of seeking members' reactions or suggestions before lodging submissions on their behalf.

Ideally, we would like to be able to send out simple monthly "What's on?" newsletters, but also have the ability to contact members promptly at any time when urgent issues arise. Email is the obvious way of doing this. Surface mail is inconvenient, expensive and often slow, and would place an unfair burden on our volunteers to process.

However, we are aware that we have several hundred members for whom we do not have an email address. If you are one of those, we urge you to do what you can to provide us one. If you do not have email yourself, perhaps there is a family member or friend that could receive our emails on your behalf. (See details on how to provide your email address elsewhere in this magazine.)

Also, it is possible that you have the ability to receive emails without realising it. If you have a smartphone, it is almost certain that you have a Gmail or Apple Mail address associated with it, enabling you to receive and send emails with your phone. Perhaps ask a family member or friend to check this out for you. Also, SeniorNet Rotorua runs Tech Assistance Dropin sessions each Monday morning in the Community Meeting Room at the public library. They can help you. This is a free community service, although a donation is appreciated.

It is a fact of 21st Century life that ability to access and use the Internet is just about essential. Your phone is one means of doing this. At our AGM forum on 1 May, there will be a presentation on "Make Your Phone Your Best Friend", which will include guidance on using your phone for email.

Speaking of the AGM, we desperately need new people to fill officer and committee roles. If Grey Power Rotorua is to survive and prosper, we need a strong and vibrant committee, so please consider whether you are able to step up and help.


The Birthplace of Scrabble **Queens, New York**

A uniquely lettered street sign marks the corner where the iconic word game was invented.

EIGHTY YEARS AFTER IT WAS first invented, the classic American board game Scrabble remains popular as ever (despite some competition from various digital copycats). The location of the beloved word game's humble origin, in a church basement in Queens, is today commemorated with a creative street sign that includes the Scrabble value for each letter of 35th Avenue. The Jackson Heights Community Development Corp was responsible for the sign. Scrabble's story began in 1938, when architect Alfred Mosher Butts sought out to invent a new game that combined his love of anagrams and crossword puzzles, while utilizing gameplay that required both skill and chance. Butts then tested out his new game, which he called "Lexiko" at the time, in the social room at the Community United Methodist Church. After experimenting with this early version of the game, he made updates to the rules and gameplay. Initially, the revised version of the game was called "Criss-Crosswords." When the

game became commercially sold it was given the name "Scrabble," and to this day that's the game played by millions of people. In front of that Queens community church, right on the corner, there is a street sign commemorating Scrabble's local origins, with letters designed to look like tiles of the game. The novel design choice has attracted many admirers to that corner, some of whom have tried to steal the sign and at least one of whom succeeded. Most mysterious was the response from the New York City Department of Transportation when asked if they planned on replacing the special sign. The city had no clue who had put it up in the first place. There was no record of the original historical marker. Perhaps a devoted Scrabble fan installed the sign on their own? Despite the original sign's unofficial status, the community's love for it convinced the city to provide a new one retaining the Scrabble numerical values, which remain there to this day.

SECURITY CONSCIOUS

It was a pleasant day outside the Friends store room. The world looked decent and honest. I should have known better. I had to be elsewhere and left my large and conspicuous shoulder bag on top of a box of books and went to the shop section of our operation.

And my wallet and cell phone went elsewhere.

The day before I had watched a U Tube item on how the young people in Sweden are now relearning the attributes of Cold War thinking. Two young men who had escaped the clutches of ISIS gave some advice. Don't panic and have a plan. Those amongst them who did, survived. Others did not.

I tried to calm my response to the stupid mistake I had made. First - a trip home to confirm I had indeed put my phone and wallet in my black bag. My multiple channel brain is known to let me down. Then to the police station hoping for a general mobilisation of all personnel. The gentleman behind the counter was a balm of methodical quietness and it was good to have him there.

Next - try to get to the ASB bank in time. It was a close thing. The screen was already drawn between the tellers and the any time money machine, but they took my police print out and set about pushing buttons. Ten minuts later and all my ASB cards had been frozen. Called in on Vodafone at 4.45pm. My sim card was frozen. I was given a new sim card for whatever phone I should choose to buy and could continue to use my same phone number.

Meanwhile; back in the jungle. I had left the store open and unattended at around 1.30pm to greet a delegation from Hamilton library. My credit card was used for a 'wave' transaction at Pak N Save at 1.47pm and then twice more at 1.50pm and 1.51pm. Then across the road to a clothing store at 2.16pm. They tried BP Connect, Lynmore at 2.59pm but that transaction never appeared on my Visa statement.

A week later the good people at ASB refunded my loss.

We sat down that first night and made a list of who, and in what order, I should contact next morning. In a systematic way I went around the town cutting off any other avenues where my cards might be used - Farmlands, Kiwibank, AA. By the afternoon I had bought a new phone.

Two points to note - there was no pin number recorded anywhere in my wallet. That was good. But I did not have a password facilitated on my phone. That was bad. I certainly do now.

Not recorded above: I made return visits the very next morning to the Police Station and the ASB bank. I must commend both sets of staff on their quiet methodical help.

There was, in summing up, little financial loss but the emotional damage was something else. My memory function (I am aged 80) was affected but now improving. The grass, the wind in the tress and the open sky above Kuirau Park will no longer lull me into complacency.

ASB have a 'Senior Line' - 0800 272 119 which is a priority line.

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When Stephen Hawking Threw a Cocktail Party for Time Travellers No one showed up.

STEPHEN HAWKING, WHO DIED at the age of 76, was a giant of theoretical physics, cosmology, and pop culture. Though affected by a degenerative disease that had doctors predicting an early death, Hawking instead lived to research the creation of the universe and its possible end, in the form of black holes. Also a popular writer, he published bestsellers including A Brief History of Time. Those who met him testified to his charisma and sense of humor.

So it was a little unusual that when he threw a party in 2009, not a single guest attended.

A film of the event depicts a dismal cocktail party. Three trays of canapes sit uneaten, and flutes filled with Krug champagne go untouched. Balloons decorate the walls, and a giant banner displays the words "Welcome, Time Travellers."

As it happened, Hawking's party was actually an experiment on the possibility of time travel. (Invitations were sent only after the party was over.) Along with many physicists, Hawking had mused about whether going forward and back in time was possible. And what time traveler could resist sipping champagne with Stephen Hawking himself?

By publishing the party invitation in his mini-series Into the Universe With Stephen Hawking, Hawking hoped to lure futuristic time travellers. You are cordially invited to a reception for Time Travellers, the invitation read, along with the date, time and coordinates for the event. The theory, Hawking explained, was that only someone from the future would be able to attend.

Unfortunately, no one showed up.

"What a shame," Hawking said. "I was hoping a future Ms. Universe was going to step through the door." But Hawking himself later discussed the dangers of time travel. In an Ars Technica interview in 2012, he said that Einstein's theory of relativity laid the groundwork for the possibility of time travel. But warping space and time could "trigger a bolt of radiation that would destroy the spaceship and maybe the space-time itself." That might be enough to keep potential partiers away.

And that's too bad, because Hawking, even as a full-time wheelchair user, loved parties and dancing. As for why he threw a time-traveller party, he explained: "I like simple experiments ... and champagne." By transmitting the invitation, Hawking thought it might catch the eye of a future time traveller—the brain-breaking paradox being that, if it eventually does, then wouldn't we have seen one or two at the party?

National will deliver local water well – Three Waters is gone!

Labour's Three Waters reform is a multibillion-dollar mega project that despite overwhelming opposition from the public, local councils, and the office of the Auditor General, they continue to plough ahead with their highly centralised co-governed entity.

This ill devised project will confiscate assets from local councils away from the very communities that paid for them. Under Labour's plan decision making for Rotorua water will be made from a hugely expensive centralised office in Hamilton.

Chris Luxon has said enough is enough – and that a National government will scrap Labour's undemocratic and unworkable Three Waters model and replace it with a sustainable system that ensures drinking water, stormwater and wastewater remain in local control.

Instead, National will set and enforce strict water quality standards and require council to invest in the ongoing maintenance and replacement of our vital water infrastructure, while keeping control of the assets that communities have paid for.

National will:

- Repeal Three Waters and scrap the four co-governed mega-entities
- Restore council ownership and control
- Set strict rules for water quality and investment in infrastructure
- Ensure water services are financially sustainable

Council will be required to demonstrate a clear plan to deliver ongoing investment in water infrastructure.


Those plans will need to be approved by the Minister of Local Government.

Whilst strict standards for water quality will be set by the Water Quality Regulator, we will establish a Water Infrastructure Regulator within the Commerce Commission to set and enforce standards for long-term water infrastructure investment.

Resilient, well maintained, future-proofed modern infrastructure will also mean our communities can better cope with mounting pressures due to climate change and accommodate housing growth that is currently being prevented by a lack of infrastructure like wastewater and stormwater services.

Under National, water stays in local communities and investment in water infrastructure is secured so that Kiwis can be sure their water is safe and affordable.



SMART HOMES



As New Zealand moves away from fossil fuels to climate-friendly renewable electrical energy, demand for electricity is going to increase. For households that purchase an electric vehicle (EV), this can become the single biggest electrical appliance.

So as EV numbers grow, we will need to think about when and how we use electricity. If we all continue to plug in without considering the overall load on the grid, the current supply may not easily be able to keep up with demand.

The good news is, we can reduce the need for expensive new electricity generation infrastructure by being smarter about how and when we use electricity. We need 'Smart Homes' to achieve this.

A smart home isn't the house itself, but a clever system that will link residential appliances together into a network and enable communication with the national electricity grid. A Home Energy Management System (HEMS) enables centralised control of the network of smart appliances in the home and can be added to a house at any time. For this to work, the appliances either have 'smart' technology built into them, or one can make regular appliances smart by plugging them in to a 'smart' plug.

The HEMS will be connected to a 'flexibility supplier' to manage the supply of electricity based on the needs of the household. The service is expected to be available within a year or so. There are steps that can be taken now to get started with this process. Go to the

NZ Government website **www.genless.govt.nz** as a starting point.

Saves money – Bills can be significantly lowered by running appliances more efficiently and shifting the energy use to periods of least cost electricity. The cost for the infrastructure is reduced which leads to lower bills.

Renewable energy first – Shifting demand to offpeak periods prioritises the use of renewable energy sources, hence less generation from fossil fuels. This in turn reduces the impact on the environment.



It's a shoe polish brand that made the word Kiwi world famous - even though the business was never New Zealand-owned.

Started in a two-roomed factory in Melbourne, it was originally an Australian product even though it sounded very New Zealand.

The brand Kiwi was named by its founder William Ramsay in honour of his New Zealand-born wife Annie's birthplace, according to Te Ara Encyclopedia.

With their distinctive name and Kiwi bird symbol, the shoe polish became staples in cities across the world, and at it's peak sold 250 million tins annually in 183 countries with 24 countries around the globe.

But its popularity is no match to the Covid-19 pandemic, and its current owner SC Johnson has decided it was no longer worth it to keep selling its polish in the UK as the shine has come off the British tradition of polishing their shoes. A Kiwi spokesman said it has seen a drop in Britons polishing their shoes which coincided with a rise in casual shoes that don't require formal polishing. It would still sell the products in countries where formal shoe care "remains relevant".

David James, 62, whose family shoe repair and cleaning firm began in Central London 100 years ago told the Daily Mail "Kiwi leaving is a sign of the times. "In part, this is because people wear suits and smart shoes much less. Covid accelerated that with more working from home, but a trend was in place before then," he was quoted as saying. "Also trainers are being worn more and more, even to work. While shoes are dying, trainers are alive. We now renovate sneakers, repair and paint them."

Kiwi shoe polish was introduced to Europe two years after it started in 1906. It was widely used by imperial forces during the wars, Te Ara said. The business was bought by Sara Lee Corporation in 1984 and then sold to SC Johnson in 2011. According to reports, the current owners now want to focus on its range of other products.

Here in New Zealand, Kiwi shoe polish continues to be available at major supermarkets and The Warehouse.

Dusting the David

How do you clean a 17-foot-tall, 518-year-old statue?



Very carefully. Six times a year, Eleonora Pucci, the in-house restorer of the Galleria dell'Accademia, takes on the daunting task of tidying Michelangelo's David.

It begins with a photographic close-up to track how the statue is faring, and to verify how much dust and microscopic debris has accumulated. Then, standing atop scaffolding, Pucci dusts the statue with a synthetic brush and sucks up any particles with a specially designed vacuum strapped to her back.

"To be able to contribute, even in a small way, to the conservation of David's beauty," Pucci said, makes hers "the best job in the world."
